Louise Sheets Fund

If philanthropy is defined as 'love of humanity,' Louise Sheets was a philanthropist. A widow with no children, the people of Botkins were her family and when she passed away at age 96, the Botkins

community became her heir. Residents knew Louise didn't like to be asked to give, but if a need was mentioned to her, somehow money quietly appeared.

Upon her death in 2001, Louise's will provided many gifts to community organizations and left the remainder of her estate to the Community Foundation to establish the Louise Sheets Fund. The Fund has made grants totaling nearly \$1.3 million since 2003 to organizations in and serving the Botkins area. Because of her gift, the fire department, rescue squad, park, public library, school, community swimming pool and more have the resources for new equipment, programming and improvements.

Louise's love of her community lives on.



Erick Richard

Erick Richard Roush Young Memorial Scholarship Fund

Future Fairlawn graduates will benefit from a scholarship created in memory of the school's 1987 valedictorian. The Erick Richard Roush Young Memorial Scholarship Fund was established by his mother, Marilyn Young, after his death in

November, 2021 following a heroic battle with brain cancer.

"Erick had received numerous scholarships and his hope would be to pass on the financial benefit of these gifts to others pursuing a college education," said Marilyn. "He left a legacy of excellence for helping people live better lives."

Erick began his career in Connecticut as a medicinal chemist where he led multidisciplinary teams in the creation and refinement of novel molecules for the purpose of discovering and developing new drugs. As a Director of External Innovation in Research Beyond Borders, he led initiatives focused in the identification and enablement of novel therapeutic mechanisms, modalities and disease indications. He later mentored and advised young scientists in the company's post-doctoral training program. He authored multiple scientific articles and patents in collaboration with industry and academic investigators.

"Erick's was a lifetime of learning and giving in many, varied realms. He was an invested questioner and explorer, dedicated to truth in all walks of life. His passion for music and song was driven by a deep and abiding faith in God and the joy of combining his gifts with those of others in music ministry."

The first scholarship will be awarded to the Fairlawn High School class of 2023.



SCARF Fund

Most entities strive for return customers, but the Shelby County Animal Rescue Foundation (SCARF) prefers that their four-legged customers leave the shelter and never return. SCARF supports the Shelby County Animal Shelter with costs for immunizations, vet care, trap-neuter-release services and facilitated donations of food, blankets and pet toys.

"SCARF's overall purpose is to assist the unwanted and neglected animals of Shelby County through support of the Shelby County Animal Shelter. We work to ensure that adoptable animals remain healthy and socialized until they find their forever home," said SCARF vice president Julie Ehemann.

The SCARF Fund at the Community Foundation of Shelby County was established in 2021 as a savings account for future large projects and other needs. One such project currently being considered is a large outdoor dog run.

The SCARF Fund is the group's second charitable fund, after their successful Building a PAWSitive Future project fund that raised money to build the Bob Sargeant and Family Shelby County Animal Shelter and Adoption Center. SCARF rallied around the need to replace the small, outdated shelter with a modern, spacious and well-equipped facility. With the completion of the new shelter, the project fund has closed.

Gifts to the SCARF Fund are welcome and ensure wagging tails and purring hearts will find permanent homes.

William Binkley Pavilion Fund



Sidney's Tawawa Park has a stunning new picnic pavilion in its Aschenbach Grove, with a walkway leading to Big Rock, one of the park's prime features. The William Binkley Pavilion Fund assisted donors and the City of Sidney by administering gifts to build the pavilion and plant new trees.

Dr. Albert Binkley Dickas, a Sidney native and retired geologist, provided the gift to build the facility in memory of his great grandfather, William Binkley, best known for his 36-year career as editor of The Sidney Journal newspaper. In the Journal, Binkley often reminded politicians and the average citizen of their duty to improve Sidney; a concept Dr. Dickas has embraced.

"Youthful hikes from home to the woods adjacent to Tawawa Lake, introduced me to the wonders of nature, not the least being the mystery surrounding the presence and origin of Big Rock," recalls Dr. Dickas. "I learned that Big Rock was an erratic, a rock fragment carried by glacial ice and deposited some distance from the outcrop from which it was derived. Following a career as an industrial exploration geologist and a University of Wisconsin professor, retirement gave me opportunity to again explore the Tawawa area where I discovered the name of William Binkley, chiseled on the west face of Big Rock.

"Realizing his memory had become lost in the annals of time, I felt a need to resurrect an account of his many community contributions. Thus was born the idea of sponsoring a picnic pavilion that would memorialize his life and educate the public to the mystery of a Big Rock located in the verdant forest reserve I have loved for nigh on 90 years."

Members of the Aschenbach family provided gifts to replace trees and were enthusiastic about the further development of Aschenbach Grove, named in the mid-1900's to honor Rueben Aschenbach, a long-time member of city park committees.

Creating a Fund

A charitable fund carries out your wishes. Here's how it works and what you can expect from us.

Fund Agreement We work with you to create an agreement specifying the fund's name and purpose and whether gifts are to be retained or spent. Template agreements are available for any of the Fund Types noted to the right. Dormant fund agreements may also be created now and then activated by a gift from your Will or other estate document.

Gifts There are many gifts options, but only you and your tax advisor should decide which is most advantageous to you. Please see page 13 for common types of gifts. Charitable funds may receive all gifts up front, over time or through your estate. Most funds must have an asset size of \$25,000 or more. The larger the fund, the more it can return to the community.

Grants Some funds, such as donor advised funds, may issue grants periodically, as you request. Others disburse annually, such as scholarship funds. Still others receive proposals from charities seeking support for their work. Grants may be issued anywhere in the U.S. and typically to qualifying not for profit organizations and educational institutions.

Investment Most charitable funds are invested in one of three portfolios to enable earnings and growth. Our ability to administer multiple charitable funds allows us to comingle them for greater investment diversification. Project Funds and Gift Accounts are not invested.

Fees The Community Foundation's operations are supported by fees assessed to charitable funds we administer. Please contact the office to request a copy of the Fee Schedule.

Fund Statements Monthly reports are provided to those who are authorized. A password protected, online portal is also available, which allows viewing of the fund's activity at any time.

Ongoing Connection to Staff The staff considers it a privilege to assist you with your charitable giving. We welcome calls, emails and visits any time you have a question, need copies of Gift Acknowledgments or want to explore an aspect of benefiting the community. We are your resource!

FUND TYPES

Community Granting Meets a wide range of charitable purposes. This fund is flexible and responsive to changing community needs. Local volunteers appointed by the CFSC award grants based upon proposals submitted by local organizations.

Field of Interest Awards grants to benefit causes or geographic regions you favor based upon proposals received and reviewed by local volunteers appointed by the CFSC.

Donor Advised Allows you to stay involved by recommending grants from the fund you established.

Gift Account A short-term Donor Advised Fund. Grants are made from principal (gifts).

Scholarship Assists students with the cost of their college education or vocational training.

Designated Assists charitable organizations specified when the fund is created.

Organization Established by a charitable organization to provide for its ongoing support.

Project Accomplishes community or capital projects. Receives gifts raised to pay for a specific project.

Supporting Organization Similar to a Donor Advised Fund but with more independence.

Investment and Spending Policy

The Community Foundation invests most charitable fund assets. The primary objective of our Investment Policy is to provide for an optimal level of total return, in real terms after inflation, and long-term growth of capital, with an acceptable exposure to risk, while maintaining the ability to support distributions.

Investment consultant Clearstead of Cleveland provides analysis and reporting to the Foundation's eight-member volunteer Investment Committee. The Investment Committee reports to the Board, which sets and monitors policy.

Project funds and most short-term charitable funds are not placed investment pools, but instead remain in money market or checking accounts to better preserve all funds until they are disbursed.




Spending Policy

Endowed funds, meant to support the community forever, follow a Spending Policy. The Policy averages a fund's balance from the prior 16 quarters and multiplies the average by a percentage to determine the amount of annual grant dollars. Using the Spending Policy, a charitable fund keeps excess market return in favorable times and continues grant awards in unfavorable times, within certain parameters. The overall goal is that the charitable fund balance and the annual grant amount increase over time. Each investment pool has its own spending rate.

Non-endowed funds do not follow the Spending Policy, as those funds have the ability to disburse total return and principal.

Ways to Give

The mission of the Community Foundation of Shelby County is to inspire donor generosity and transform it into meaningful, lasting impact through charitable gifts. We carry out the legacy of people who provide a gift meant for short-term, long-term or permanent use within the Shelby County area.

While we welcome your gifts that add to any existing fund, we also can assist you in creating new funds that carry out specific charitable purposes.

Giving Options

During life or through your estate, there are many options to make a gift in a way most advantageous to your personal situation. As a 501(c)(3) public charity, gifts are deductible at the highest levels allowed by law. Please contact Jessica Fortkamp, Donor Relations Director at jfortkamp@commfoun.com or (937) 497-7800 with questions or to request a copy of our Gift Acceptance Policies for General, Real Estate or Life Insurance gifts.

Cash – An online credit card gift or a check made payable to the Community Foundation of Shelby County is easy. Note the name of the intended fund on the check's memo line to ensure your gift is correctly credited. See page 8 for gifting details.

Public Securities – The fair market value of transferred shares is deductible, up to 30% of your yearly adjusted gross income. You may avoid capital gains on appreciated stock and mutual funds when we receive and sell the shares. You may also transfer privately held stock, if certain requirements are met.

Real Estate – The Community Foundation can accept qualifying gifts of residences, farm land, commercial property and undeveloped land. In most cases, such gifts are sold and the proceeds benefit a charitable fund.

Grain - Transferring ownership of grain enables farmers to give without incurring taxable income from the sale of the commodity. The cost of production may still be deducted on your tax return.

Life Insurance – An easy way to make a significant gift! Consider transferring ownership of an unneeded policy or developing a new policy to benefit the community in the future. Depending upon the policy, you may deduct the cash value or ongoing premium payments. You may also make the Foundation a primary or secondary beneficiary of your life insurance.

Local students volunteered for Random Acts of Christian Kindness (RACK) by making blankets that will be distributed by Right to Life of Shelby County. Grants from Donor Advised Funds helped purchase fabric.

IRA – If you are 70½ or older, your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) may transfer up to \$100,000 a year to the Community Foundation to benefit most types of charitable funds, excluding Donor Advised Funds. The IRA gift is non-deductible, but you benefit from avoiding income taxes on the disbursement.

Charitable Gift Annuities – A partially deductible gift to the Community Foundation that pays you or someone you designate a set amount each year for life. Any remainder held by us at the date of death adds to or creates a charitable fund.

Charitable Lead Trusts and Charitable Remainder

Trusts – Lead Trusts pay a fixed amount to the Community Foundation for a specified number of years with the remainder transferred to beneficiaries you name. Remainder Trusts, pay you or your designee for life with the remainder benefitting the Community Foundation. Both types provide you with tax benefits.

Private Foundation Transfer - Greater simplicity, fewer rules! Convert private foundation assets into a Donor Advised Fund to decrease your administrative burden, increase your tax advantages and focus your time on supporting favorite charities.



CFSC Trustees and Staff

Our board of trustees is comprised of Shelby County natives and long-term residents who value the principles, work ethic and community spirit found here. The board's role is to be active stewards in the investment and distribution of charitable dollars, ensuring that each charitable fund stays on the path indicated by the establishing donor or organization. Trustees are nominated by the current board of trustees and appointed by the Judge of the Shelby County Court of Common Pleas. Trustees may serve two five-year terms.
