Granting Funds

247 charitable funds are housed within the Community Foundation of Shelby County, each one created to help its donor support the charities and issues they feel most passionate about. Some charities will receive a one-time grant and others receive multiple, periodic grants that will continue long into the future.

What charities do the work you value? You can help them today and tomorrow by creating a fund that gives those organizations the resources to carry on their important work.

Scholarships

When you create a scholarship fund, the invested assets generate a scholarship year after year. Graduating high school seniors, current college students completing their degrees, and young adults pursuing a skilled education all need your help to better afford schooling.

Whether a single scholarship or one that renews to support additional collegiate years, you can empower students to obtain a higher education and a better life. In 2023, 95 scholarship funds within the Community Foundation awarded more than 187 scholarships, totaling more than \$346,000.

Community Granting

Many give to help our discretionary granting program, known as Community Grants, award sums based upon proposals submitted by local organizations. Eight charitable funds give full or limited ability for grants targeting ever-changing needs in the Shelby County community. Your gift to the annual Community Foundation Partners Program also supports Community Grants.

This year, grants supported temporary housing for the homeless, school-based counseling for at-risk youth, health screening kits for cardiac patients, and so much more! Community Granting funds are flexible and always ready to support changing needs and local opportunities.

Your gift during the Community Foundation's annual Match Day event may be doubled to help one or more participating charities. Held on Giving Tuesday (the Tuesday after Thanksgiving) it's an enthusiastic event that lets you help charities meet and exceed a goal of \$5,000 in matching money. In 2022, it was inspiring to watch more than \$812,000 raised for the 25 participating charities. Every dollar matters and every gift helps your favorite local charity receive the full matching

Giving that Continues Valued Programs and Services

You give because you want to help the charities and communities you value. The programs these charities provide, the lives that are touched, and the difference that is made inspires you to continue supporting their work. Where would Shelby County be without these charities? Where would these charities and your community be without you?

The Community Foundation of Shelby County helps people support the values that are important to them now and forever. When we receive a gift from a Will or Trust, the funds are set in a charitable fund that supports the causes or charities the donor intended to benefit. Depending upon the type of gift, the donor's estate receives a tax deduction.

How do I decide what to support?

Start with those places where you give your time, talent, and treasure today or in your past. Do you volunteer for an organization that could use help? Would you help the people in your town by giving to a charitable fund that provides for the ever-changing needs of things like its parks and charities? Do you want to make available to future generations the programs that have impacted your life or helped a family member? Talk to us about those ideas and we can help you make it happen.

What do I need to do?

First, work with your attorney to add a line in your Will or Trust that provides a gift to the Community Foundation of Shelby County. The statement can add details like what you want the money to support or it can be general, with the details provided to the Community Foundation in advance. You can also make the Community Foundation a beneficiary or alternate beneficiary of a life insurance policy or the remainder of an IRA or other retirement vehicle, which does not involve a change to your Will.

Many people work with us to create the document that will be activated someday by a gift from their estate. These dormant fund agreements can be altered at any time during your life and then, once a gift is received, will continue to carry your good works into the future.

Legacy Society

If you inform us that you are planning to leave an estate gift to the Community Foundation of Shelby County, we will offer you the opportunity to be included in our Legacy Society. If you prefer anonymity, we will always respect that as well. Our Legacy Society members are located on page 4.

Ways to Give

The mission of the Community Foundation of Shelby County is to inspire donor generosity and transform it into meaningful, lasting impact through charitable gifts. We carry out the legacy of people who provide a gift meant for short-term, long-term or permanent use within the Shelby County area.

While we welcome your gifts that add to any existing fund, we also can assist you in creating new funds that carry out specific charitable purposes.

Giving Options

During your life or through your estate, there are many options to make a gift in a way most advantageous to your personal situation. As a 501(c)(3) public charity, gifts are deductible at the highest levels allowed by law. Please contact Ashliegh Maurer, Donor Relations Director at amaurer@commfoun.com or (937) 497-7800 with questions or to request a copy of our Gift Acceptance Policies for General, Real Estate or Life Insurance gifts.

Cash – An online credit card gift or a check made payable to the Community Foundation of Shelby County is easy. Note the name of the intended fund on the check's memo line to ensure your gift is correctly credited. See page 8 for gifting details.

Public Securities – The fair market value of transferred shares is deductible, up to 30% of your yearly adjusted gross income. You may avoid capital gains on appreciated stock and mutual funds when we receive and sell the shares. You may also transfer privately held stock, if certain requirements are met.

Real Estate – The Community Foundation can accept qualifying gifts of residences, farm land, commercial property and undeveloped land. In most cases, such gifts are sold and the proceeds benefit a charitable fund.

Grain – Transferring ownership of grain enables farmers to give without incurring taxable income from the sale of the commodity. The cost of production may still be deducted on your tax return.

Life Insurance – An easy way to make a significant gift! Consider transferring ownership of an unneeded policy or developing a new policy to benefit the community in the future. Depending upon the policy, you may deduct the cash value or ongoing premium payments. You may also make the Foundation a primary or secondary beneficiary of your life insurance.

IRA – If you are 70½ or older, your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) may transfer up to \$100,000 a year to the Community Foundation to benefit most types of charitable funds, excluding Donor Advised Funds. The IRA gift is non-deductible, but you benefit from avoiding income taxes on the disbursement.

Charitable Gift Annuities – A partially deductible gift to the Community Foundation that pays you or someone you designate a set amount each year for life. Any remainder held by us at the date of death adds to or creates a charitable fund.

Charitable Lead Trusts and Charitable Remainder

Trusts – Lead Trusts pay a fixed amount to the Community Foundation for a specified number of years with the remainder transferred to beneficiaries you name. Remainder Trusts, pay you or your designee for life with the remainder benefitting the Community Foundation. Both types provide you with tax benefits.

Private Foundation Transfer – Greater simplicity, fewer rules! Convert private foundation assets into a Donor Advised Fund to decrease your administrative burden, increase your tax advantages and focus your time on supporting favorite charities.

Kermit T. and Ella M. Kuck Fund

The path of the Kermit T. and Ella M. Kuck Fund has been as unique and interesting as the story of the Kucks themselves. Both natives of New Knoxville, Ella gave up her teaching career in 1940 to marry Kermit, who would become the president of the iconic Monarch Machine Tool Company in 1961.

Kermit died in 1989 and Ella in 2013, reaching age 101. In 1999, she established charitable remainder trusts to benefit her sons Joe and Ted, with the remainder going to charity after their deaths. Joe passed in 2014 and a few years later, the charitable remainder trust was brought to the

Community Foundation by Ted for its administration. Ted was highly interested in seeing that the remainder from both trusts benefitted the New Knoxville and Sidney communities.

Ted advised the Kuck Fund, issuing grants to several local charities. After his 2022 death, the Fund transitioned as planned to a Field of Interest fund that awarded its first competitive grants this year to New Knoxville's Firefighter's Association and Historical Society and to Sidney's Council of Religious Education. The fund agreement also directs annual grants to the family's churches, First Church of New Knoxville and St. John's Lutheran Church in Sidney.



Reese & Mary Gross

Reese C. Gross Funds

The late Mary Gross was known as a sweet lady and, through her estate, her legacy grows as a very giving lady. Her gifts resulted in two charitable funds bearing her husband's

name that benefit youth baseball & softball programs and Houston High School grads.

The first Reese C. Gross Fund has provided more than \$40,000 since 2001 for equipment and uniforms to Sidney baseball and softball programs. IUTIS Club and Sidney Amateur Baseball have benefitted so they can help boys learn the game, focus and teamwork, thanks to the support of the fund.

The second fund, the Reese C. Gross Scholarship Fund, recently came under the umbrella of the Hardin-Houston Local School Foundation, within the Community Foundation. Beginning in 2024, two \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded to Houston graduating seniors who demonstrate need, academics, school and community service and leadership.

Ironically, Reese and Mary Gross had no children, but their generosity is providing great opportunities for local kids.

Investment and Spending Policy

The Community Foundation invests most charitable fund assets. The primary objective of our Investment Policy is to provide an optimal level of total return, in real terms after inflation, and long-term growth of capital, with an acceptable exposure to risk, while maintaining the ability to support distributions.

Investment consultant Clearstead of Cleveland provides analysis and reporting to the Foundation's eight-member volunteer Investment Committee. The Investment Committee reports to the Board, which sets and monitors policy.

Project funds and most short-term charitable funds are not placed in investment pools, but instead remain in money market or checking accounts to better preserve all gifts until they are disbursed.


Spending Policy

Endowed funds, meant to support the community forever, follow a Spending Policy. The Policy averages a fund's balance from the prior 16 quarters and multiplies the average by a percentage to determine the amount of annual grant dollars. Using the Spending Policy, a charitable fund keeps excess market return in favorable times and continues grant awards in unfavorable times, within certain parameters. The overall goal is that the charitable fund balance and the annual grant amount increase over time. Each investment pool has its own spending rate.

Non-endowed funds do not follow the Spending Policy, as those funds have the ability to disburse total return and principal.

FUND TYPES

Community Granting These flexible funds are responsive to a wide-range of changing community needs. CFSC-appointed volunteers review proposals submitted by local organizations and award grants based upon community needs and merits of a request.

Field of Interest Similar to Community Granting Funds, but with a specified restriction or field of interest, such as a cause or geographic region. Grant proposals are reviewed by CFSC-appointed volunteers.

Donor Advised Allows you to stay involved by recommending grants from the fund. These funds are great for tax planning as you receive a deduction in the year a gift to the Donor Advised Fund is made. You and any successor advisors you name can recommend grants in the future using investment return and, if desired, the gifts placed in the fund.

Gift Account These short-term Donor Advised Funds help with tax planning, especially if you are bunching deductions in one tax year and taking a standard deduction in the next. You recommend grants to favorite charities until your gift is depleted, so that charities continue to receive uninterrupted support from you. Gift Accounts are great for converting stock and grain gifts into cash that is then given to your preferred charities.

Scholarship Assists students with the cost of their college education or vocational training. Most awards are for one year but some are renewable. Scholarships may be tailored to benefit high school seniors or adults.

Designated The fund agreement, when written, names charitable organizations that are to receive an annual grant. These grants continue your support to charities and enable them to rely on a stream of funding.

Organization Established by a charitable organization to provide for its ongoing support, these funds are established by an organization's board and act as a reserve for emergencies or planned growth.

Project Accomplishes community or capital projects. Receives gifts raised to pay for a specific project. The Fund closes at the conclusion of the project and once all gifts have been disbursed.

Supporting Organization Similar to a Donor Advised Fund but with more independence.

Creating a Fund

A charitable fund carries out your good works. Here's how it is created and operated.

Fund Agreement We work with you to customize an agreement that will help you support your favorite causes or organizations. If you are considering a fund created by your Will or other estate document, we can write the fund agreement for a future time..

Gifts You have many gift options. Please see page 6 for common types. Charitable funds may receive all gifts up front, over time or through your estate. Most funds must have an asset size of \$25,000 or more.

Grants Some funds, such as Donor-Advised Funds, issue grants as you need them sent. Others disburse annually, such as scholarship funds. Still others receive proposals from charities seeking support for their work. Grants may be issued anywhere in the U.S. and typically to qualifying notfor-profit organizations and educational institutions.

Investment Most charitable funds are invested in one of three portfolios to enable earnings and growth. Because we administer assets of multiple charitable funds, comingled assets enable greater investment diversification. Project Funds and Gifts Accounts are not invested.

Fees The Community Foundation's operations are supported by fees assessed to charitable funds we administer.

Fund Statements Monthly reports are provided to authorized persons through emails and a password protected, online portal.

Ongoing Connection to Staff We consider it a privilege to assist you with your charitable giving. We welcome calls, emails and visits any time. We are your resource!

CFSC Trustees and Staff

Our board of trustees is comprised of Shelby County natives and long-term residents who value the principles, work ethic, and community spirit found here. The board's role is to be active stewards in the investment and distribution of charitable dollars, ensuring that each charitable fund stays on the path indicated by the establishing donor or organization. Trustees are appointed by the current board of trustees and may serve two five-year terms.
